One of Minster's most widely known men was laid to rest in St. Augustine's cemetery here Tucsday morning following services in the church, when the bier of Joseph Brinkman, aged 78 years and nine months, was lowered into its grave.

Mr. Brinkman, affectionately known to practically everyone in this community, both young and old, was in his 60th year of employment at the Wooden Shoe Brewing company when death intervened, early last Friday, to break this long-standing tie.

Afflicted with failing health, which contrived to slow considerably his activities of many years, particularly in recent months, Mr. Brinkman became seriously ill ten days before the end, and was bedfast during this period.
