Mr. Daniel Ritter passed away on Thursday morning of this week at his home on Fourth street in Minster at the advanced age of

eighty-five years. He was one of the very elderly persons of this community and he had an interesting career as a merchant in this city during his life. He came to Minster when he was a young man and conducted a furniture store at a site on east Fourth street over a period of more than fifty years. He salo served the people of the community as an undertaker during the larger portion of the time. The passing of Mr. Ritter marks the exit from the stage of community action of the last member of that company of business men who have been referred to as "Floneer merchants in Minster." Many of them died within the past several months. Among this number of operators not one remained in the field longer than Mr. Ritter and very few of them covered a larger field than he did while he was in the midst of his largest activities. Mr. Ritter was born in Korhes, Germany, on December 18, 1848, and he continued to live in that country until he was sixteen years of age. He was a son of John Ritter and Elizabeth Rowiddle Ritter, both of whom had been born and rearred in the Fatherland. They came to America in about the year of 1864 and brought their family with them. They established themselves in this section of Ohio and one member of their family, who is Mrs. Katherine Gerber, sister of the decoased Daniel Ritter, is still living in Minster.
