

PAUL F. SCHOTT, age 91 of New Bremen, died on Friday, October 17, 2014 at 5:00 P.M. at the Miami Valley Hospital, in Dayton. He was born on November 5, 1922 in Chattanooga, Ohio, the son of the late Frederick W. and Wilhelmina (Emerick) Schott. On November 8, 1949 he married June Nolan, who survives in New Bremen. Also surviving are their children Jennifer and William Wheaton, of Norton Shores, MI, Peggy and Michael Hurick of Brunswick, MD, Pamela and William Hartman of Grafton, VA, Randy and Cindy Schott of Long Beach, NY, twelve grandchildren, nine greatgrandchildren, a sister Irene Heron of St. Henry, and a brother Dale and Mary Schott of Ft. Wayne, IN. He was preceded in death by eight brothers and sisters.

Paul was a member of Zion Lutheran Church in St.

Marys. He was a 1941 graduate of Wilshire High School. He was a member of American Legion Post 241 of New Bremen. Paul served in the U.S. Army during WW II, serving under General George Patton in the 3rd Army, 7th Armor, 203rd Anti-Aircraft Division. He was a recipient of five Bronze Stars, participating in 19 major battles from Normandy to the Balkans, including the 2nd wave at Normandy, Battle of the Bulge, and the Bridge at Remagen. Paul retired in 1985 from Goodyear – St. Marys after 43 years of service. Funeral Services will be held on Wednesday, October 22, 2014 at 10:30 A.M. Zion Lutheran Church in St. Marys with the Rev. Bill Maki officiating. Burial will follow at the German Protestant Cemetery in New Bremen with full military honors by the American Legion Post 241. Calling hours will be held on Tuesday, October 21, 2014 from 3:00 until 7:00 PM at the Gilberg-Hartwig Funeral Home, and one hour prior to the services at the church on Wednesday.
