DIED AT HIS HOME IN DAYTON, OHIO, AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Was Reared In An Orphanage And Came To Minister When A Lad

The funeral of George Schuler will be held this, Friday morning, at nine o'clock at St. Augustine church in Minister and the body will be interred in the local cemetery. The deceased lived in this city during an early period in his life and he is well remembered by many people. Members of his family were in this city on Wednesday and completed arrangements for the funeral and burial.

Mr. Schuler was born in Cincinnati on April 25, 1864, and he lived to the age of 63 years, 5 months and 16 days. During the past year friends have received unfavorable reports about his health and they were not surprised to learn that he had passed away. He was a victim of cancer of the stomach and suffered extremely at certain intervals. About two months ago he sought his bed because of the severity of the disease and he never thereafter was able to walk about.

Mr. Schuler was living in Dayton at the time when disease overtook him and his death finally occurred in that city on Tuesday, October 11, 1927. During his early life death robbed him of his mother and his father and he was received by attendants in an orphanage as the only recourse in such a sad emergency. When he was sixteen years old he was released from the institution and he then came to Minister where he lived until about five years ago when he went to Dayton.

At the age of twenty-five years he was married to Mary Vanderhorst at Minister and they became the parents of nine children, seven of whom are living, namely: Peter, Alfred, Raymond, John and Joseph Schuler, Mrs. Mary Nickamp, Mrs. Philomina Gomes, all residents at Dayton. There are eleven grandchildren.

Mrs. Schuler died in Minister on October 14, 1919, and the body was buried in the local cemetery.

The deceased was a member of Holy Rosary church at Dayton and he was also affiliated with the St. Boniface society in Minister.
