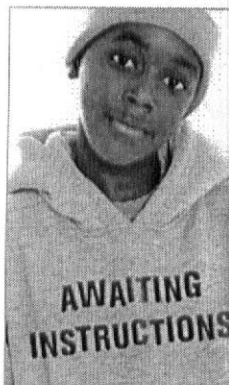

Fort Loramie thus was mourned the death of one of its most distinguished sons, a man who during more than 80 years of useful citizenship took a keen interest and an active part in just about every progressive community activity.

When death occurred for William H. Quinlin at his residence in the neighboring village Monday evening, an extended career as a public servant, civic leader and business man, was ended. He was in his 87th year.

Although the scope of his work had become curtailed by age, he nevertheless was active in community affairs up to the time of his last illness. He was serving as mayor when taken ill five months ago, and was confined to bed during the last six weeks preceding his death, suffering with a complication of diseases.

No history of Fort Loramie and community would be complete without the interesting life story of the man who served the village as its head more than 80 years. William Henry Quinlin was born Feb. 14, 1859, at Mt. Tabor Hill, near West Liberty, in Champaign county. He came to the German settlement four miles east of Ft. Loramie, with his father and family, when about four years old. He attended the German rural school and Sidney high school, and then served a three-year apprenticeship at the Thompson drug store in Sidney.

From Sidney he went to Ottumwa, in Pultam county, where he had employed two months,

and from there went to Coldwater to accept a position in the Hoyer and Nee store. He stayed there nearly two years. Mr. Quinlin opened his own drug store in Ft. Loramie on Aug. 19, 1883, in a building he and his father built.

In his long life in Fort Loramie Mr. Quinlin served more than 20 years as mayor. He was elected the first time in 1917, and served from Jan. 1, 1918 to Dec. 31, 1933. He was again elected in 1939 and remained in office until his death.

In addition to serving as mayor, the veteran village official held a number of other offices at various times. He has been corporation clerk and township clerk, and justice of the peace. He was postmaster under President Cleveland. For many years he was in charge of the village telephone exchange, the installation of which he helped bring about.

Mr. Quinlin was united in marriage with Mary Willman on Aug. 26, 1888. The late Ft. Loramie, Miss performed the ceremony in St. Michael's church. Four children were born to the venerable couple. They are Miss Marie of Fort Loramie, John W., who operates a drug store in Chicago, Raymond who is proprietor of a Cincinnati drug store, and Edmund of Fort Loramie. Mr. and Mrs. Quinlin celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1938, and would have marked their 57th anniversary this month. The widow survives with the four children. Mrs. Mary Doolley at Sidney is a sister. There are 11 grandchildren.

A lifelong Catholic, Mr. Quinlin received the last sacrament of the church. He was a charter member of the Ft. Loramie Catholic Knights of America.

Requiem high mass was offered in St. Michael's church, Ft. Loramie, by Fr. Anthony Mueller, Thursday morning. Interment was made in Graceland cemetery, Sidney.
